
DISCUSSION GUIDE

WEEK 32

MISSION/VISION





REACH - As Jesus reaches for the lost, we should do the same. LEARN - The more we learn about Christ, the more we will look like Christ. LOVE - Christians are called to love everyone because Christ died for everyone. MULTIPLY - Christ-followers should "reproduce themselves in others" to carry on the legacy.

Scriptures



Luke 15:1-7; Jude 1:17-23; Hebrews 10:23-25; Ephesians 4:11-16; Luke 23:29-39; 2 Timothy 2:2

Devotional Questions

- What did your life look like before you accepted Christ as your Savior?
- If you are a Christian, are you reaching others as Jesus did? If so, how are you reaching them?
- When a sinner comes to know Jesus, do you act like the brother who stayed home? Or the father? Leaders, begin by giving your story in one sentence, and then have your students take turns telling their story.
- What does suffering and pain look like in your school?
- How are you reaching people who do not believe in Jesus?
- Would you consider yourself a young Christian or a mature Christian according to Ephesians 4:13?
- This week, what is one way you can learn and imitate Christ?
- Have you ever faced someone who mocked Jesus? How did you react?
- Would you choose to die for someone who hated you?
- Do your daily actions mock who Jesus is?
- Which criminal represents you? Are you denying Jesus or serving Jesus?
- Why would Jesus see the Cross as an act of love?
- Do you love the body of Christ?

Essential Doctrine



Mission | Evangelism tells the Gospel, and it's the first part of our mission statement: REACH. Without people, the body of Christ cannot be a whole body. We must reflect on the actions of Jesus and reach others with the Gospel. In order to know Jesus and His mission, we must learn about Him through prayer and reading the Bible. We are commanded to love our neighbors as ourselves. We are commanded to multiply ourselves into others.

Christ Connection



The first thing we must do is pursue Christ. He wants us to go after Him by carrying our cross daily and by putting Him above everything else in our lives. Once we put Him at the center, then He wants us to pursue others. Jesus came to seek and save the lost, and we should do the same thing.

We are unable to share the Gospel with our own understanding of this world. We must lean on the Lord and His teachings to reach others. Christ tells us to come to Him with all our questions, wonders and concerns.

Jesus did not come to die for certain people. He came for those who have strayed, departed, and returned.




- Why is it necessary to make sure people see Christ in us for our ministry to be effective?

WEEK 33

REDEMPTION



Main Point



God sees and responds to those who are oppressed and suffering.

Scriptures



Exodus 3:2-15; 4:1-5

Devotional Questions

- Do you ever have trouble believing God hears you when you pray? Why?
- What might we learn about God's character from His speech to Moses?
- Which of these characteristics of God have you witnessed in your own life recently?
- What are some other examples of God's drawing near to His people in Scripture?
- Why do you think it is important that God displays both characteristics? How
 does His transcendence and immanence offer you hope and comfort today?
- How have you seen God's power manifested after taking a step in faith and obedience?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Transcendent | God's transcendence refers to the fact that He is distinct from and independent of His created world. He is transcendent over us in regard to His greatness and power as well as His goodness and purity. The implication of this doctrine is that God is inherently superior to humanity; His thoughts and ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8–9). When God saves us, He restores us so we can fulfill our human purpose; this does not mean that we become God or that distinctions between God and humanity are obliterated. Understanding God's transcendence evokes awe and wonder at His goodness and power.

Christ Connection

God told Moses His name is "I AM" as a revelation of His transcendent self-existence. Jesus is the eternal Son of God, the great "I AM," who came to us to save us from sin.



WEEK 34

REDEMPTION



Main Point



God's people are saved through a substitute.

Scriptures



Exodus 7:14-18; 12:3-8, 12-13, 29-32

Devotional Questions

- What are the false gods our society turns to for security?
- What are some idols in your life you may need to confront to draw your attention back to Him?
- What warnings might we receive from God today when we refuse to listen to His instruction? What does it take for God to get your attention?
- Why was it important for the sacrificial lamb to be spotless? What did being spotless signify?
- The blood on the door was a public statement for all to see. How does this influence the way we think of our faith?

Essential Doctrine



God Is One | The Bible affirms that God is one, as seen in Deuteronomy 6:4-9, otherwise known as the *Shema*. In both Old and New Testament times, the advocacy of monotheism (belief in one God) was contrary to the surrounding culture. Where most cultures practiced polytheism (belief in multiple gods) or henotheism (the worship of one god with the belief in multiple gods), the people of God knew, based upon God's self-revelation, that Yahweh, the Lord, is the only one true God.

Christ Connection



Just as a spotless lamb was sacrificed to spare God's people from His judgment in Egypt, so also Jesus Christ is the Passover Lamb who was sacrificed in order to protect us from God's wrath.

In Defense



Skeptics will often say the Christian faith isn't rational or founded upon the evidence, but is the result of wishful thinking. Of course, the way the Bible presents faith – as 2,000 years of church history – nothing could be further from the truth. Faith has never been an intellectual blind leap into the dark, but has always stood on historical facts and evidences. Even here, it is reasonable to conclude that the Israelites needed to witness these miraculous plagues themselves to have faith that God had heard them and was coming to their rescue. While faith is much more than evidence, faith certainly relies upon the evidence and makes use of it. Historical evidences – such as the Resurrection of Jesus – serve as the very bedrock of our faith.




- How does this account highlight both God's judgment and grace?

WEEK 35

REDEMPTION



Main Point



God protects His people.

Scriptures



Exodus 13:17-22; 14:1-4, 13-14, 21-22, 26-28

Devotional Questions

- Do you usually react as the Israelites did when your circumstances become difficult? Why do you think we are so quick to stress out and whine when life gets tough?
- How have you seen the power of God after waiting a long time for Him to act?
- Why do you think it is important to see the connection between the Red Sea and Jesus' work on the Cross?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Omnipotent | God is all-powerful: there is nothing God cannot do so long as it does not contradict His own nature or law. God has power and authority over the universe He created, from the largest solar system to the smallest particle. Affirming that God is all-powerful does not mean that God can sin – since that would go against His perfect moral nature. As Christians, we rest in the belief that the God who has all power is good, and we gain great comfort by knowing an all-powerful God is working for our good and joy.

Christ Connection



God made a way of deliverance for His people through the Red Sea. In a similar manner, God made a way of deliverance for us by sending His Son, Jesus. Through faith in Jesus, we are saved from sin and death.

In Defense



People often ask why they don't see big, miraculous displays of God's power today, such as the parting of the Red Sea. While there are several ways to respond, it is important to mention the purpose behind miracles in the Bible. For the most part, the Bible shows that miracles were intentionally and strategically done to verify a word from God. A good example is the Gospel's spreading to the unreached people groups who were hearing the message of Jesus for the first time in the book of Acts. Miracles done by God through the apostles served as a visible proof that the message these men were proclaiming wasn't their own, but God's.

Do miracles like these happen today as the Gospel continues to move forth? Christians answer this differently. However, the important point to make is that big flashy miracles aren't necessary to support our faith. Like the disciple, Thomas, we already have plenty of reasons to believe the Christian faith to be true. We can look at the world around us and marvel at God's fine tuning in bringing this masterpiece into existence. We can look at the changed lives of the disciples and those we know. Ultimately, we can look to Jesus Himself, sit under His teachings in the Gospels, and begin to realize He is more compelling than any miracle we might witness.



WEEK 36

UNCHAINED



Main Point



In a world of conflicting messages, God's Word provides the truth we need, guiding us to faithfully follow Jesus when we surrender and obey it.

Scriptures



John 8:31-32; Matthew 4:18-25; Matthew 5:3-12

Devotional Questions

- How has your walk with Jesus not matched the expectations you had about following Him? (Matthew 5:3-12)
- What is your most common motivation for being obedient to Jesus? In what ways have your motivations changed throughout different seasons of your life?

Essential Doctrine



Whether we want to admit it or not, the media has massive implications on our culture, not only impacting the thoughts we have about following Jesus but shaping the way we follow Him in our everyday lives. As our assumptions about what it looks like to follow Jesus meet the conflicting messages of the world, we then live our lives based on the inconsistencies of those messages which will not result in faithful obedience. In the Gospels, Jesus told His disciples about what following Him would really be like compared to what their expectations were. He knew what their thoughts were about following Him, just as He knows what our thoughts and expectations are today about following Him. As your group unpacks the Scripture from today, your students will learn what Jesus said following Him would really be like.




- Matthew 5:3-12 lists several realities of following Jesus and calls them blessings while many of us would not. How can you, throughout this week, begin to consider these aspects of your relationship with Jesus a blessing?
- What is one false message from the world that you have been believing and acting on, and how can you replace it with God's truth this week?

WEEK 37

UNCHAINED



Main Point



While technology offers many opportunities, we must guard ourselves and use it to glorify God, remembering that our identity is found in Christ, not in what we see or hear through technology.

Scriptures



Mark 1:35; Colossians 3:1-3; Philippians 4:8; James 3:4-10; Psalm 139:13-16



- How does culture use technology to distract from God's plan and promises?
- Why do you think it's important to use technology for God's glory?

Essential Doctrine



Technology can be a tricky thing. So often, it distracts us from what God wants for us. Because of this, it causes us to turn our temptation into sin through doubting our worth and making decisions we later regret. The Bible tells us to do all things to the glory of God, so why should that be different for technology? Through the lens of Philippians 4:8, it's essential to make sure everything we post, like, or share runs through a filter so that we hold ourselves accountable for our own actions and thoughts, and keep others from stumbling.




- In what ways can you use your technology to bring glory to God?

DISCUSSION GUIDE

WEEK 38

UNCHAINED







Narcissism, characterized by self-absorption and the pursuit of personal greatness, is something faithful disciples of Jesus actively reject, choosing instead to focus on Christ.

Scriptures



Luke 17:33; Acts 8:9-13, 18-23; Philippians 2:3-4

Devotional Questions

- How have you seen self-focus negatively affect your own relationship with Jesus and your relationships with those around you?
- Simon makes it clear that he wanted the power he believed Peter possessed. Why do you think Simon wanted this power (Acts 8:9-13, 18-23)?

Essential Doctrine



Self-focus has taken over our culture by storm. Our students constantly face messages such as, "you just need to be confident in you," "do what makes you happy," and "put yourself first." However, this kind of thinking is in complete opposition to the truth communicated in Scripture. Whereas culture tells us to put ourselves first, Scripture tells us to deny ourselves. Being a disciple of Jesus is not about gaining power or influence for ourselves, as Simon thought, but about putting God first and foremost. It doesn't stop there, because we must put others first as well, as Philippians called us to.




- In what ways have you acted in selfish ambition this past week? In which types of situations have you been the most likely to focus on yourself?
- What is one way you can practically put someone else first this week? (Leader, dig a little deeper into your students' answers to this question. Take time to write the answers and have the students be specific in their action steps. At a point later this week, reach out through text and ask them if they have had a chance to do this.)

WEEK 39

UNCHAINED







Through Christ's sacrifice, we are freed from shame and made worthy, no longer bound by our past mistakes.

Scriptures



1 Peter 2:16; Romans 8:1-4; 1 Timothy 1:13-17; John 8:36; Ephesians 2:8-10



- How do you define freedom?
- Who are people in your life that need to experience the freedom God gives us?

Essential Doctrine



In a world that brings us a lot of uncertainty, there is a true freedom available to us. When we confess and believe in Jesus and what He did on the Cross (Romans 10:9–10), we receive this gift of freedom. The freedom we have in Christ reminds us that we are worthy and righteous in the eyes of our Creator. From this, we never have to feel as though we are good enough. Christ makes us truly complete in who we are, and there's nothing we can do to lose our freedom – Praise God!




- How can you share the freedom you have in Christ with family and/or friends this week?

DISCUSSION GUIDE

WEEK 40

UNCHAINED



Main Point



God's goodness is shown through His sustaining grace toward His people.

Scriptures



Exodus 16:2-4, 13-20; 17:3-6

Devotional Questions

- Why is functional atheism not genuine Christian faith? Can you tell a difference in your own life?
- What is your first reaction to the Israelites' complaining? Why?
- When was the last time you complained about a situation you were in? How does complaining reveal a sense of entitlement on our part?
- Why do you think God didn't want the people to receive more than a day's worth of manna?
- In what ways has the Lord provided for you, even in difficult times?
- God intended to train and form His people during their years in the wilderness. How might God be forming you through difficult times?
- What does complaining about our circumstances say about our heart's posture toward God?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Gracious | God's nature is to delight in giving unmerited favor to those who are undeserving (Ephesians 2:8–9). His grace toward sinners is found most clearly in the salvation He has provided through Christ. Because of sin, humanity is undeserving of salvation – all of us have turned our backs on God, and as a result, we deserve death (Romans 6:23). However, instead of leaving people in their sins, God has demonstrated His graciousness by providing atonement and forgiveness for our sins through the death and Resurrection of Jesus (2 Corinthians 5:21).

Christ Connection



Moses struck the rock instead of the people, and water flowed for the people's salvation. Jesus is the Rock who was struck for our salvation, the Rock whose living water satisfies us forever.




- Why do some people wrongly assume difficult times must be the result of God's anger or disapproval toward them?

PROMISES



Main Point



God equips His people with wisdom.

Scriptures



Exodus 18:7-18, 24-27

Devotional Questions

- When have you praised God because of His work in someone else's life?
- · How does God receive honor when we rejoice at all He is doing with others?
- When has someone in a leadership position delegated responsibility to you? When have you delegated responsibility while in a position of leadership?
- How might a solo leader, no matter how good he or she is, hurt the people being led?
- In what other areas of life do you think this leadership principle exists?
- What burdens are you carrying that you need to let God handle?


Essential Doctrine



Body of Christ | The New Testament describes the Church as the body of Christ. The Church lives and operates as Christ's representative here on earth, with Christ as its head (Colossians 1:18). This means that the Church is an extension of Christ's ministry, carrying out His work by fulfilling the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18–20). In addition, the picture of the Church as the body of Christ shows us the interconnectedness of individual Christians, with each member dependent upon one another for growth and sanctification (1 Corinthians 12).

Christ Connection

Moses needed others to help him complete the task of preserving the unity of God's people and teaching them God's laws. God has provided us the church body, with Christ as the head, to work together to fulfill our task of sharing the Gospel with the world and bringing others into His body.




- Why do you think God designed it so that no one person could fulfill all these roles?

WEEK 42

PROMISES



Main Point



Our relationship with God influences our relationship with others.

Scriptures



Exodus 19:3-6; 20:1-8, 12-17

Devotional Questions

- What rules from your parents have you come to appreciate and respect more over the years?
- Why do you think God wanted His people to live differently from the surrounding nations? What might this communicate about God to others?
- How do people break these commandments today?
- What are some ways God's name is misused today? Why does God take this so seriously?
- In what ways do you sometimes struggle to honor your parents?
- What commandment do we tend to ignore the most when it comes to relating to other people?

Essential Doctrine



Special Revelation | Special revelation refers to God's revealing Himself to humanity through historical events, His Word, and through Jesus Christ. Through special revelation, human beings learn about God's character, His will, His purpose for creation, and His plan of redemption. Special revelation shows us the nature and character of God, and because God has revealed Himself in this way, we can know Him - through a saving relationship with Him in the person and work of Jesus Christ.

Christ Connection

The Law reveals how we properly live in relationship with God and others. Because of sin, it is impossible to keep the Law. Jesus, the sinless Savior, is the only One who has kept the Law of God perfectly, and we are credited with His righteousness when we trust in Him.

In Defense



Apart from God, the concept and reality of goodness would not exist. In other words, apart from having a moral lawgiver whose character is completely good, we would be unable to say with any authority that acts are either good or bad, right or wrong. All morality would be relative – good for some, maybe bad for others. We would be unable to say acts of terrorism are wrong or that torturing an infant for fun is an act of evil. Of course, the very thought of horrific things such as those not being declared evil and wrong is unsettling to us, and rightly so. Why? Objective goodness exists because God exists. Though evil may prevail for a time, as Christians we take refuge in Jesus – the One who promises that one day He will wipe away every tear, making all wrongs right, as He makes all things new again (Revelation 21:4).




- How might your relationship with God influence your relationships with other people?

- How can the people of God love our unbelieving friends, family and neighbors with the Gospel this week?

WEEK 43

ELEVATE



Main Point



Idolatry happens when we worship something or someone else besides God.

Scriptures



Exodus 32:1-14

Devotional Questions

- What are some objects of worship for people today?
- What do you think of when you hear the word idol? In what ways do we still deal with idols today?
- Why do you think God was angry with the people?
- What do you expect to satisfy you? What do you do when it fails to truly satisfy?
- When have you asked someone to pray for you? How did it encourage you to know that someone was making requests to God on your behalf?
- Whom will you pray for that needs salvation? How will you point that person to Jesus this week?

Essential Doctrine



Guilt and Shame | Guilt refers to the objective status of someone being found guilty for a wrong committed as well as the incurring of punishment that comes with it (Matthew 5:21-22; Jas. 2:10). Shame is the emotional pain that comes from sinful actions. Scripture teaches that human beings are guilty in an objective sense and feel the weight of shame in a subjective sense.

Christ Connection

When the children of Israel sinned, they needed a mediator (Moses) to intercede on their behalf. Jesus Christ is the perfect mediator between a holy God and sinful humanity, and He faithfully intercedes on behalf of His people.




- How are we like the Israelites in this account?

WEEK 44

ELEVATE



Main Point



God desires to be near His people.

Scriptures



Exodus 36:2-7; 39:42-43; 40:34-38

Devotional Questions

- What do you think motivated the Israelites to keep giving?
- Do you think they gave because they wanted to (cheerfully) or because they had to (begrudgingly)? Why?
- What does the text infer about God's gifting people artistically?
- How has God gifted you to serve Him and others in His kingdom?
- List other places in Scripture that mention God's desire to dwell among His people.
- How does the truth that God dwells within you impact your everyday life?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Holy | God's holiness refers to His uniqueness in being separate from all He has created. The Hebrew word for *holy* means "separate" or "set apart." God's holiness also refers to His absolute purity. God is unstained by the evil of the world. His goodness is perfect, and the moral code we find in the Scriptures reflects His holy nature. As people made in God's image, we are called to holiness.

Christ Connection

God instructed the Israelites to build a tabernacle so He could dwell with them. God wants to be with His people. For this reason, God would later send His Son to "tabernacle," or dwell, with us to bring us into His presence.



- How might the thought of God's desire to dwell among His people affect the way you battle sin in your life?

- What are some ways grace has changed your heart?
- Why is it wrong to think some gifts/professions are sacred and some are secular?
- If you are interested in the arts in some way (graphic design, painting, sculpture, illustration, acting, writing, etc.), how does this encourage you to pursue that craft for the glory of God?

WEEK 45

PROMISES



Main Point



God provides atonement for the people's sins.

Scriptures



Leviticus 16:2-6, 15-22

Devotional Questions

- What stands out to you in this text about the Day of Atonement?
- What do you think it was like for Aaron and consecutive high priests to approach God on the Day of Atonement? How can we approach a holy God?
- What are ways people try to approach God on their own terms or in their own way?
- · How was atonement made?
- What ways can you point people to the perfect advocate and sacrifice for sins Jesus Christ?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Holy | God's holiness refers to His uniqueness in being separate from all He has created. The Hebrew word for *holy* means "separate" or "set apart." God's holiness also refers to His absolute purity. God is unstained by the evil of the world. His goodness is perfect, and the moral code we find in the Scriptures reflects His holy nature. As people made in God's image, we are called to holiness.

Aaron was an imperfect high priest who was required to make atonement for himself and God's people every year. Jesus is the perfect High Priest who made atonement once for all time with His own blood.




- In which ways is Israel on the Day of Atonement a picture of ourselves?

WEEK 46

LOST



Main Point



Rebellion against God is rooted in failing to trust God.

Scriptures



Numbers 13:1-2, 30-33; 14:1-4, 30-35

Devotional Questions

- What are some circumstances in your life that help you remember God's faithfulness and remain faithful to Him?
- What impossible situations have you faced, or are you facing, and how is God teaching you to trust Him in those situations?
- What did the Israelites' fear reveal about their trust in God?
- How does fear sometimes keep you from following God's plan?
- What are some ways that our actions reveal what is in our hearts?

Essential Doctrine



Sin as Rebellion | Because the Bible portrays people as responsible beings, called to respond in faith and obedience to God's revelation, the Bible often portrays sin in terms of defiance and rebellion toward God the King. Isaiah 1:2 is one of many passages that describe sin in terms of rebellion against God: "I have raised children and brought them up, but they have rebelled against me." Seen in this light, sin is personal and willful disobedience, the raising of a clinched fist toward the One who made us.

God's people rebelled against Him and refused to enter the land He had given them because they failed to trust His provision and promises. Jesus fully trusted the Father and entered the world in obedience bringing about the fulfillment of God's promise to provide One to save people from sin.



LOST



Main Point



The bronze serpent points to both God's punishment of sin and His salvation through Jesus.

Scriptures



Numbers 21:4-9; John 3:14-15

Devotional Questions

- When have you been impatient with God? Did your impatience cause you to grumble about what He had or had not done? Explain.
- What does the Israelites' punishment communicate about the seriousness of sin?
- When you realize you've sinned against God, what is your immediate response usually?
- What is the significance of God's command for the people to gaze at the snake? What were the people to consider as they looked upon it?
- What does your attitude about your sin indicate what you believe about God?
- How does the completed work of Jesus motivate you as you seek to live for Him?

Essential Doctrine



Sin and Death | The ultimate consequence for sin is death - physical death, spiritual death, and eternal death (Romans 6:23). God was clear to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden that if they ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, they would surely die (Genesis 2:17). The type of death that would result from the Fall in the garden of Eden wasn't only physical death but spiritual death as well, the separation of a person from God. Spiritual death continues in a permanent state when someone dies apart from the reconciling work of Christ, who defeated death through His own death on the Cross and subsequent Resurrection.

Just as the Israelites looked upon the bronze serpent lifted high on the pole and were healed, so also we look with faith upon Jesus Christ lifted high on the Cross and are saved from the punishment of our sin.



LOST



Main Point



God is faithful to keep His promise to bless His people.

Scriptures



Numbers 23:19-23; 24:5-9, 17-19

Devotional Questions

- How encouraging is it to know that much like the Israelites here, God is for you and not against you?
- What does it say about God's character that He isn't willing to go back on the promises He has made?
- How does knowing that God will never lie or fail to keep a promise encourage you to trust Him more?
- How does God's promise to restore and make all things new one day prompt the way we live each day now?
- What smaller victories do we tend to focus on and find contentment in rather than longing for the greatest victory God has given us in Christ?

Essential Doctrine



God Is Faithful | God's faithfulness means He keeps His word and always fulfills His promises (1 Corinthians 1:9; 2 Timothy 2:13; 1 Peter 4:19). God's faithfulness is demonstrated in His fulfillment of the promises He made to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The apostle Paul linked the attribute of "faithful" to God's coming through on His word: "He who calls you is faithful, who also will do it" (1 Thessalonians 5:24). We reflect God by keeping the promises we make to Him and to others.

Balaam could not curse God's people but blessed them instead and proclaimed God's faithfulness. Balaam's blessings ultimately were realized centuries later in Jesus. Jesus is the conquering King who fulfilled God's covenant promises and delivered His people from sin and death.



God warns of the consequences of unfaithfulness to Him.

Scriptures



Deuteronomy 31:14-23; 32:44-47

Devotional Questions

- Where have we seen other instances of God's meeting with His people?
- How can the biblical motif of God's dwelling among His people help us in those moments when we feel as if He isn't near?
- How does God's response to the Israelites' idolatry serve as a warning to us about harboring modern-day idols of the heart?
- Why do you think God wanted this message to be communicated through song?
- How are we beneficiaries of God's faithfulness to the Israelites? What does this say about His love for the nations today?

Essential Doctrine



Enslaved to Sin | Because of the Fall of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, all of humanity has inherited a sin nature that inclines them toward sin and rebellion. Human beings are enslaved to sin (Romans 6:17), continually living with the propensity to transgress God's commandments whenever possible. It isn't until one experiences salvation through the work of Christ that he or she is able to overcome sin's enslavement through the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 8:2).

Despite the people's ongoing sinful rebellion, God promised to be with them and provided them with words of life. Jesus is the Word of God who paid the penalty of our sin so that we might have life and relationship with God.

In Defense



In this account we see a strong and powerful motif within Scripture in that God wants to dwell among us! The Creator of the universe, the holy and all-powerful God, wants to be involved in the day-to-day aspects of our lives. This fundamental Christian theme is radically different from the other religions of the world. For them, it is about working our way to God, while Christianity is about God's coming down to dwell among us. Theirs are religions of earning enough credits to somehow please their god and be rewarded, whereas Christianity is about receiving God's gift of friendship and righteousness through the reconciling work of His Son, Jesus Christ, which results in life-long communion with Him that extends to all eternity.




- Was there a time when you lived on the borrowed faith of someone else? At what point did that begin to change?

Essential Doctrine



Christ as King | God has always been King over His creation, whether in heaven or on earth. Yet some of His creatures in both realms have rebelled against Him, leaving destruction in their wake. To restore His broken world, God promised a King who would deliver His people and restore all of creation. The promise of a coming King finds its fulfillment in Jesus Christ and looks forward to its perfection when Jesus returns for His Bride, the Church.

Jesus is the Prince of Peace of whom Isaiah and the other Old Testament prophets spoke. Through His sinless life, death and Resurrection, Jesus makes right what we made wrong because of sin.




- How do the circumstances of Jesus' birth help us understand how His rule is different from other kings?



Devotional Questions

- Where in your life have you seen God's consistency?
- What is an attribute of God that you have been made aware of multiple times in your life? (immensity, goodness, justice, mercy, grace, omnipresence, immanence, holiness, perfection)

- How are you preparing your heart for the new heaven and new earth?

Essential Doctrine



The Gospel allows us to come to Jesus for salvation as well as daily renewal. As we grow in sanctification, we are not perfect. God's mercy is free and available to us every day. We can trust in Him for our eternal life as well as our everyday strength and decisions.

We are only made new by the redeeming blood of Jesus. His work on the Cross is sufficient to make us new, and we do not need to add any works to earn our way to heaven. We are invited into a relationship with God through this justification – and we are sanctified through our obedience to God and the work of the Holy Spirit.

- When have you relied on God and realized it was worth it?
